



**PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR
TERMINATING STATES OF EMERGENCY**

16-07

I, Jay R. Inslee, Governor of the state of Washington, terminate the following proclamations pursuant to RCW 43.06.210:

1. Proclamation 13-02 dated April 22, 2013, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Pierce County for roadway damage involving a State Route 16 overpass.
2. Proclamation 13-04 dated May 24, 2013, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Skagit, Snohomish, and Whatcom counties for roadway damage and its effects involving the collapse of the Interstate 5 bridge over the Skagit River.
3. Proclamation 13-08 dated October 3, 2013, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Cowlitz and Yakima counties for roadway damage caused by wind and rain storms.
4. Proclamation 14-02 dated March 22, 2014, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Snohomish County for damage, destruction and loss of life resulting from a catastrophic landslide.
5. Proclamation 14-03 dated April 2, 2014, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Grays Harbor, King, Lewis, Lincoln and Pierce counties for roadway damage from erosion, flooding and landslides caused by storms producing extreme rainfall.
6. Proclamation 14-04 dated July 15, 2014, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Adams, Asotin, Benton, Chelan, Columbia, Douglas, Ferry, Franklin, Garfield, Grant, Kittitas, Klickitat, Lincoln, Okanogan, Pend Oreille, Spokane, Stevens, Walla Walla, Whitman and Yakima counties for wildfires and activated the organized militia.
7. Proclamation 14-05 dated July 20, 2014, which proclaimed that Proclamation 14-04 remained in effect and, pursuant to the provisions of RCW 43.06.220(1)(i), to preserve and maintain life, health, property or the public peace, imposed a temporary outdoor burn ban by prohibiting all outdoor and agricultural burning in the area affected until noon on July 25, 2014.
8. Proclamation 14-06 dated July 25, 2014, which proclaimed that Proclamation 14-04 remained in effect and, pursuant to the provisions of RCW 43.06.220(1)(i), to preserve

and maintain life, health, property or the public peace, extended the temporary outdoor burn ban imposed by Proclamation 14-05 by prohibiting all outdoor and agricultural burning in the area affected until noon on August 1, 2014.

9. Proclamation 14-07 dated August 1, 2014, which proclaimed that Proclamation 14-04 remained in effect and, pursuant to the provisions of RCW 43.06.220(1)(i), to preserve and maintain life, health, property or the public peace, extended the temporary outdoor burn ban imposed by Proclamation 14-05 and extended in Proclamation 14-06 by prohibiting all outdoor and agricultural burning in the area affected until noon on August 8, 2014.
10. Proclamation 14-08 dated August 1, 2014, which proclaimed that Proclamation 14-04 remained in effect and found that motor carriers and drivers of commercial motor vehicles delivering fuel products from distribution centers in the Pacific Northwest to Okanogan County in support of firefighting efforts were providing emergency relief during an emergency under 49 CFR §390.23 and exempt from application of 49 CFR §§ 390 through 399, including the driver hours of service rules in § 395, until midnight on August 9, 2014, and under the provisions of RCW 43.06.220(10)(i) prohibited application of the exemption to certain activities.
11. Proclamation 14-09 dated August 8, 2014, which proclaimed that Proclamation 14-04 remained in effect and, pursuant to the provisions of RCW 43.06.220(1)(i), to preserve and maintain life, health, property or the public peace, extended the temporary outdoor burn ban imposed by Proclamation 14-05 and extended in Proclamations 14-06 and 14-07 by prohibiting all outdoor and agricultural burning in the area affected until noon on August 15, 2014.
12. Proclamation 14-10 dated August 15, 2014, which proclaimed that Proclamation 14-04 remained in effect and, pursuant to the provisions of RCW 43.06.220(1)(i), to preserve and maintain life, health, property or the public peace, extended the temporary outdoor burn ban imposed by Proclamation 14-05 and extended in Proclamations 14-06, 14-07 and 14-09 by prohibiting all outdoor and agricultural burning in the area affected until noon on August 22, 2014.
13. Proclamation 14-11 dated August 22, 2014, which proclaimed that Proclamation 14-04 remained in effect and, pursuant to the provisions of RCW 43.06.220(1)(i), to preserve and maintain life, health, property or the public peace, extended the temporary outdoor burn ban imposed by Proclamation 14-05 and extended in Proclamations 14-06, 14-07, 14-09 and 14-10 by prohibiting all outdoor and agricultural burning in the area affected until noon on September 3, 2014.
14. Proclamation 14-12 dated August 27, 2014, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Okanogan County for damage from flooding, landslides and erosion caused by storms producing extreme rainfall.

15. Proclamation 14-13 dated December 10, 2014, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Clallam, Jefferson, Whatcom, King and Skagit counties for extensive roadway damage caused by storms producing extreme rainfall.
16. Proclamation 14-14 dated December 29, 2014, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Mason and Okanogan counties for roadway damage caused by storms producing extensive rainfall.
17. Proclamation 15-02 dated January 30, 2015, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Cowlitz County for extensive damage to roadways from flooding, erosion and landslides caused by a storm producing heavy rainfall unseasonable snowmelt.
18. Proclamation 15-03 dated February 27, 2015, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Clallam, Douglas, Jefferson and Whatcom counties for extensive roadway damage from flooding, landslides and erosion caused by storms producing extreme rainfall.
19. Proclamation 15-04 dated March 11, 2015, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Pierce County for roadway damage and its effects involving an Interstate 5 overpass.
20. Proclamation 15-05 dated April 16, 2015, which proclaimed a state of emergency in King and Pierce counties for separate roadway damage incidents and their effects involving an Interstate 90 overpass and an SR 410 bridge.
21. Proclamation 15-07 dated April 23, 2015, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Kittitas County for roadway damage and its effects involving an Interstate 90 overpass.
22. Proclamation 15-10 dated June 10, 2015, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Whatcom County for roadway damage and its effects involving an Interstate 5 overpass.
23. Proclamation 15-11 dated June 26, 2015, which proclaimed a state of emergency in all of Washington's 39 counties for wildfires.
24. Proclamation 15-13 dated August 21, 2015, which proclaimed that Proclamation 15-11 remained in effect in all of Washington's 39 counties and found that motor carriers and drivers of commercial motor vehicles delivering fuel products from distribution centers in the Pacific Northwest to counties in Eastern Washington in support of firefighting efforts were providing emergency relief during an emergency under 49 CFR §390.23 and exempt from application of 49 CFR §§ 390 through 399, including the driver hours of service rules in § 395, until midnight on August 9, 2014, and under the provisions of RCW 43.06.220(10)(i) prohibited application of the exemption to certain activities.

Proclamation 15-14 dated September 18, 2015, which proclaimed a state of emergency in Clallam, Cowlitz, Grays Harbor, Island, Jefferson, King, Kitsap, Lewis, Mason, Pacific, San Juan, Skagit, Snohomish, Thurston, Wahkiakum and Whatcom counties for loss of life and damage to homes, businesses, public facilities and infrastructure resulting from
